Dress - wear light-colored, long, loose clothing.


Defend-choose good repellent such as DEET.



Education, Politics, and Religion at the Founding of America

For the Founders of our country, education was of a paramount concern, uniquely Christian and most definitley bible-based. For instance, in Puritan New England, one of the very first laws passed was called "The Old Deluder Act, so called because it was intended to defeat Satan, the Old Deluder, who had used illiteracy in the Old World to keep people from reading the word of God. The New England Primer was used to teach colonial children to read and included the Lord's Prayer, the Apostles Creed, and the text of many hymns and prayers.

We can also see the importance of education in the rules of many of our first colleges. For instance, in The Laws and Statues of Harvard College in 1643 we read: " Let every student be plainly instructed and earnestly pressed to consider well the end of his life and studies is to know God and Jesus Christ which is eternal life (John 17:3). Yale College listed two requirements in its 1745 Charter: "All scholars shall live religious, godly, and blameless lives according to the rules of God's word, diligently reading the Holy Scriptures, the fountain of light and truth and constantly attend upon all the duties of religion, both in public and secret. The Reverend John Witherspoon was the only active minister who signed the Declaration of Independence; Witherspoon was best described as the man who shaped the men who shaped America.

In many schools, particularly in the late 19th and early 20th centuries the McGuffey Readers were the main text book. The Readers, unlike their predecessor the New England Primer, mirrored this non denominational Protestantism through a veiled Christianity as opposed to a direct use of the King James Bible in efforts to educate young people. The McGaffey Reader invoked a more non denominational, less orthodox religious tone.

A significant shift for those advocating the centrality of religion to public schools came in the early mid 20th century. As has always been the case, public schools serving as microcosms of society reflected not only the dominant values and ethics of society but also serve as an important economic and intellectual purpose. So as the needs for society changes so do the public schools. In the middle of the 20th century it was commonplace for the school day to begin with a religious prayer or invocation. Beginning in 1962 cases made their way through the courts and in every instance the court found such prayers violated the Establishment Clause.

Since the 1940's when the 14th Amendment was applied to the 1st Amendment, public schools have been limited in what counts as permissible in relation to religion and public schooling. "The Federal Guidelines for Religious expression in Schools ", sums it up, these guidelines developed by a wide ranging panel first commissioned during the Clinton administration and the reauthorization under George W. Bush, emphasized that restrictions on religious expression are limited to school personnel while in their official capacity. Students have free range to express their religious beliefs in public schools, short of harassment, so although some have claimed that God has been removed from the public schools, legal records tells us that it has been only limited to the school officials, Not students!

Under the Equal Access Act (1984) student initiated religious groups are still permitted in the public schools. However, teachers cannot create or lead these groups, though they are allowed to monitor them. In our diverse

and interdependent society, understanding and respecting the religious values (or the choice not to believe) of other's is important. In the United States, this places an obligation on the public schools to rethink its role in helping young citizens understand the history and contributions of religion in society. The relationship between religion and public education is one that has been tied to politics; religious and secular. Recognizing the direct connection between religious illiteracy and religious intolerance one can hope that the role of religion and public schools can come closer to fulfilling their obligation in producing a more moral, ethical and righteous society.





Q. I got a letter that states that I am being automatically enrolled into a prescription drug plan by Medicare. I don't want to lose my retirement health plan, what should I do? - Cindy

A. Very good question. The letter you received means that you have qualified for Low Income Subsidy (LIS). Once you qualify for LIS, Medicare will automatically assign you to a prescription drug plan. In most cases, qualification for LIS means that you will not have to pay a premium for your drug plan and most of the copays will be paid. This should not affect your health plan, as the drug plan only covers your prescriptions. However, it is always best to visit with your retirement plan administrator to verify. The most important thing for you to do right now is to check the plan formulary to ensure that all of your prescriptions are covered. When you are automatically enrolled, this step isn't always done thoroughly by Medicare. If the prescriptions you are taking are not on the plan formulary, then they will not be covered by the plan. Community Exploring Uses for Your Required Minimum Distribution Part I: The Qualified Longevity Annuity Contract

As we approach the end of the year, many of you will be needing to take your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your retirement accounts. That must be done by Thursday, Dec. 31, 2019. You work with your plan provider or financial institution where your retirement plan or IRA is held and complete a distribution, because it is required by the IRS. You can do so by completing a form or through providing instructions to your financial institution.

The RMD typically 1) begins at age $70^{1/2}$ (or April 1st in the year following the year you turn $70^{1/2}$) and 2) takes into account the plan balance from Dec. 31 of the previous year and 3) utilizes the IRS tables for mortality – how long you are expected to live. The number or factor for mortality usually is the divisor into the balance which then determines the amount that must come out. That amount - with some exceptions- is taxable income.

This article further explores utilizing some of your assets in your retirement plan to address concerns you might have regarding finances later in life. One of these that is often heard about is not running out of income. This in part might be addressed through utilizing the Qualified Longevity Annuity Contract (QLAC) with your RMD. It is a way for you to 1) provide for future lifetime income while 2) lowering the taxable amount of your RMD.

Here is how it works: You have the option of moving 25% or \$130,000 from your retirement account (whichever is less) one

time during your retirement into a OLAC. That movement is not taxable, and it also lowers the retirement account balance hence making future payments smaller and the tax owed potentially less on future distributions. Simultaneously the distribution is moved into the QLAC in the form of a deferred income annuity. That is a vehicle that offers fixed income payments. Current rules specify that the annuity must begin making lifetime payments to you no later than age 85. A deferred income annuity can offer fixed payments for life - cannot be outlived while potentially also offering survivor benefits. Many might consider this arrangement as an addendum to your income plan or a personal pension plan as it is individualized for you.



On September 18th, more than 35 community representatives of health-related service providers in Walton County heard the preliminary findings of the Walton Community Health Improvement Partnership's (WCHIP) Community Health Needs Assessment which conducted surveys and interviews with key partners in the spring of 2019 and voted on new priorities for the next three-year cycle. The updated needs assessment will be presented at the Healthy Walton



Summit on November 13th at Santa Rosa Beach Community Church from 10 a.m. – 3 p.m. Between 50 and 75 representatives



of service providers and community stakeholders from Walton County will come together to develop a plan to address the top identified priorities. This event is free and open to the public. At the September WCHIP meeting, the group overwhelmingly agreed that housing, mental health, substance abuse, access to healthy foods, and preventable injuries and diseases were the most important issues the community was facing.

Some of the findings in the needs assessment that stood out: 30.9% of children in Walton

County live in poverty, compared



to 20.3% in the state of Florida. Another was that in 2018/19, the school system identified 468 homeless students (including those students doubled up in housing with extended family or friends). In addition, the number of homeless individuals recorded in the annual Walton County Point-in-Time Homeless count jumped from 99 in 2017 to 173 in 2018. Inadequate mental health care and a lack of affordable housing were cited as the two biggest causes of homelessness among those surveyed. As the population continues to grow in Walton County (by some measures, it's currently the 5th fastest growing county in the U.S.), it will become increasingly important that the community comes together to address these issues, to continue to be a safe and appealing place for both residents and visitors alike.

A benefit to being part of the Walton Community Health Improvement Partnership is the chance to hear from partner organizations about upcoming events and priorities. For Caring and Sharing of South Walton, registrations for the Angel Tree program are beginning and a save-the-date notice was given for the January 25th "Cost of Poverty Experience." Also, the

November 18th "Day of Impact" of 90Works in Fort Walton Beach is upcoming, where services like legal aid and other services will be open to the general public. Hope Medical Clinic is exploring adding telehealth mental health services for its clients in Destin and Freeport, and PanCare is working to get telehealth urgent care made available to all of Walton County schools. The UF/IFAS extension office in Walton County is collecting peanut butter (with donations being matched) for local food pantries as part of the Peanut Butter Challenge, from October 1st -November 27th. There is still funding available through the Early Learning Coalition for families struggling to afford childcare, and Walton County has become the first county in the Panhandle to become part of the Age Friendly Communities Network, thanks to the hard work of WCHIP and the Walton Okaloosa Council on Aging.

It's great to see so many people coming together for the good of the community, which meets every other month on Wednesday mornings at the Department of Health in DeFuniak Springs or South Walton. October at Topsail Hill Preserve State Park

The month of October rolls in with the "Rollin' Through the Decades" Vintage RV show and astronomy program "Topsail Under the Stars" at Topsail Hill Preserve State Park. Visitors will be able to stroll through the campground and tour close to one hundred campers from decades such as the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s.

This is also the time of year that the Florida Black Bears are preparing for the winter. Due to the warmer climate, they don't hibernate like their northern bear relatives. They do however sleep for periods of time for a denning period which aren't as long or filled with as deep of sleep as their northern bear relatives. Of course, by prepare for this denning period, we mean exploring for more food to eat and store up body fat to help them while they're sleeping. To do this they are increasing their diet intake from 5,000 to 20,000 calories a day. That is a lot of food. This means they are a lot more active and possibly even more

visible. So, if you're planning a hike on any of the beautiful trails throughout the park it is important that you be "bear-wise" as you're sharing the woods with them. There are several signs throughout the park with more information about bears to help you be "bear-wise." However, as large as the preserve area is you still are bound to be out hiking all day without seeing them at all.


Because the range of a female Florida Black Bear is 15,000 acres and a male Florida Black Bear is 60,000 acres it is important to know how to also be "Bear-Wise" at your own home. There are things you can do this time of year which will help these beautiful creatures stay focused on finding natural foods for their winter preparations. Especially since they have a keen sense of smell. Take in any bird feeders before sunset. Don't leave out any pet food or water bowls. Putting out your trash just before time for it to be picked up helps as well versus putting it out the night before. If you have a barbecue, make sure to completely clean your grill afterwards.

October also brings the start of the Topsail After Dark series. This series is a unique opportunity for people to experience the park in a new way, nocturnally. It is being kicked off with a monthly campfire program on the fourth Friday of the month. This month the campfire will be on October 25th 6:30-7:30p.m. Participants must make sure to arrive at the park before the gates close at sunset. Stay tuned for more program offerings.

Learning opportunities are abound as well. All the regular favorites continue like Breakfast with a Ranger, Plant Stroll, Art in the Park and the #SundayFunday weekly ranger program. The Topsail Talks series presentation will allow visitors to visually explore the beauty of the artificial reefs in the Florida Panhandle.



Eat Your Veggies!

Last month, it was about encouraging healthy eating for children. One of the most common complaints is an aversion to

vegetables. Given that this food group is indisputably important, the first recommendation is to introduce vegetables early and often. Even if the baby seems to react negatively, consistency is key. If kids are a little older, the advice still stands: Modeling and consistency. And, of course, one can get a little creative with cooking methods and recipes.

The first and easiest cooking technique is to simply wash, chop and eat. Fresh raw vegetables are LIVE foods that are enzyme active and alkalizing to the systems. As a rule, a minimum of 50% of your daily food intake should be healthy, fresh, LIVE foods. Including fresh raw vegetables will not only help reach that goal, it will also help with acid/alkaline balance and fiber needs - all the while providing an amazing array of nutrients. To encourage children, set out cut veggies at a time you know they are truly hungry. Everything tastes better when hungry! Allowing them to dip veggies in salad dressing or even peanut butter might also encourage them to indulge.

Although most vegetables can be eaten raw, there are some that require cooking to neutralize certain elements. For example, eggplant and potatoes contain a compound called solanine, which inhibits the absorption of calcium and can cause neurological and gastrointestinal disorders. Some green beans, lima beans, and kidney beans require cooking to neutralize compounds that cannot only block the absorption of important nutrients, they can be toxic enough to make you ill. Most greens and cruciferous vegetables can be eaten raw however; some cruciferous vegetables contain goitrogenic substances that can block the production of the thyroid hormone. If one has

a disorder of the thyroid, it may be beneficial to cook these vegetables more often than not.

A common misconception is that cooking will destroy vital minerals and vitamins but this is not the case when done properly. In fact, for some vegetables heating can increase digestibility by breaking down the cellulose wall, providing easier access to the nutrients while destroying or neutralizing the anti-nutrients. Heat based cooking techniques including roasting, stir-frying, or grilling should be done quickly when using high temperatures to preserve nutrient content and prevent the formation of acrylamide, which is potentially carcinogenic. Most vegetables are best served al dente, rather than cooked soft, highlighting the flavor and enhancing the nutrient content.

NOTE: Microwave cooking creates irradiated foods that have molecules found NOWHERE in nature. I do NOT recommend cooking vegetables in the microwave, especially NOT in any type of plastic bag or container.

One favorite way to prepare

vegetables is super easy and sure to please even the most finicky palate. ROASTED (BAKED): Simply cut vegetables so that they are a similar size, toss in oil, put on a cookie sheet or place in a shallow roasting pan and season. Slow roasting at 325 degrees will dehydrate vegetables while sweetening their flavor. This method is good for root vegetables like potatoes and beets. Medium temperature baking at 350 degrees will cook the vegetables evenly and round out their flavors, while high temperature baking at 400 degrees or higher will caramelize the vegetables but leave them juicy and al dente. Simple seasoning with sea salt and ground pepper works well for almost every vegetable, highlighting their natural and unique flavors.

The cruciferous vegetables like broccoli, asparagus, brussels sprouts and cauliflower are particularly good roasted. If one has never been a fan of these vegetables before, try them this way seasoned with nothing more than salt and pepper. Root vegetables like potatoes, onions, carrots, beets and garlic are also terrific roasted. Simply toss in oil and season with salt and pepper. Fifteen minutes before they are ready add some fresh chopped rosemary to really give good flavor.

Medicare Annual Enrollment Season is Here!

The Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) season is October 15th through December 7th each year. It is a time that Medicare beneficiaries can add, change, or drop their Medicare Advantage or Medicare Part D prescription drug plan. Medicare Advantage plans replace original Medicare Parts A & B with Medicare Part C.

Lives can change every year and one might need a new plan because of health issues, doctors, and hospitals; prescriptions may have changed if they are generic or brand names. Also, plans often change or new plans are added because competition is always driving health care plan improvements.

Original Medicare has deductibles and copays with no limits, and Medicare Advantage Plans put caps on out of pocket costs and often has policies with no premiums. Most Medicare Advantage Plans include prescription drugs; however, there are plans that do not include drug plans that Veterans find appealing, with \$0 premiums that still allows them to use VA hospitals and doctors.

Medicare Advantage Plans or Part C Plans are HMOs and PPOs administered by insurance companies. HMOs normally have lower out of pocket costs, but everything is run through the primary care doctor and must stay within their network of doctors and hospitals. A PPO allows one to go to any doctor within the network without referrals from their primary care physician and must pay an extra fee to see a physician who is outside of the network.

Which plan is most suitable? Not all plans have the same doctors, hospitals, drug formularies, deductibles and copays. If doctors, hospitals and prescriptions drugs are important, one must find the best plan that meets needs and keeps costs down. An independent agent can help instead of a captive agent who represents only one company and its plans. A good independent agent would gather important information about who are the important doctors, hospitals and prescription drugs, and match them to the best plan. That plan might not be what is best for a neighbor, relative or friend.

Medicare Advantage Plans often include benefits not covered by original Medicare Parts A & B, like transportation, acupuncture, chiropractic, dental, vision, and fitness membership. It is important to review one's current plan each year to see if it's still the right fit. Simply stated, review and compare.

Personally, due to my needs, I am going to change plans during the AEP. I was happy with my plan, but am changing to another plan that has the same doctors, hospitals, and additional benefits, and will cost me \$0 compared to my old plan of \$42 per month, which is a \$504 savings for the year. But, everyone is different and every plan is different.






it. I noticed that I was engaging my core muscles in daily movements, keeping my back safe from strain. It really just became a natural thing after doing the repetitions on the reformer.

There's no doubt. He gives me the dime tour of his bedroom-a shrine to the Tigers.

There are seventeen thousand orange ballcaps adorning his walls. Bo Jackson autographs, Gus Malzahn posters, stuffed tigers, eagle figurines, and Shug Jordan coffee mugs.


During the tour, Kenny breaks into spontaneous song:

"WAR EAGLE! Fearless and true, "Fight on, you orange and blue..."

He finishes his performance by hugging me. Kenny gives good hugs.

In the corner is an Auburn Christmas tree, weighted with orange ornaments-he keeps it up year round. Auburn bedspreads, throw rugs, drapes, pillows, lightswitch covers.

"When we first had Kenny," says his father. "Doctors told us



our baby had issues. Told us we'd better let him go and institutionalize him."

Kenny's father informed the doctor they would do no such thing. Instead, the family built their world around the new baby. They loved him.

"Raising him was the big blessing of our life," says Kenny's father. "We were never alone, that's part of life in a small town. You're never alone. This community raised Kenny with us."

Kenny spent twenty years finishing school. His teachers supported him. His peers adored him. Ask around, everybody and their mother's cousin's aunt loves Kenny.

After Kenny finished high school, he took a job at McDonald's. He worked as a custodian and greeter for twenty-three years. This is where he became famous. There aren't many people in town who don't know him. That's twenty-three years of grins, Auburn chants, broompushing, laughing, and spontaneous hugs.

He retired a few years ago.



piece, was a reminder that not all advice is good:

My grandpa once told me not to use my blinker when driving because "it's no one's business where you're going."

No flashlight on your phone? Take a photo of the sun, and use it in the dark.

Mom said to always say what's on your mind. That advice is why I was called into HR today.

My friend's dad told her, "If you're doing something that you'll regret in the morning, just sleep until the afternoon."

How does one discern the caliber of the advice received? Does it measure up against the character or reputation of those offering the recommendation? Is it a quantitative process whereby statistically "nine out of the ten or so times it's turned out ok?" Does one watch what family, friends, or trusted neighbors think, say or do? How influential are the opinions of media or prominent public figures? What concerns does one have of "what people may think" based on acceptance or rejection of the advice?

Where to start?

A good place to begin is with one's personal values. Many derive them from their faith beliefs. One remembers watching their parents, or whomever was entrusted with primary upbringing, and likely tried to borrow from what seemed to their best work. At school there was a favorite teacher who probably taught lessons that transcended what might be gleaned from a textbook. In earliest work environments as one made mistakes, there was often a boss or co-worker who effectively set it straight.

Trust instincts. Everyone knows the "tough" kids in the neighborhood. Later as teens, when driving around with the windows down on a mild evening, one learned the places to avoid. In transactional business, one gets a feeling in the gut when he comes across the proverbial "snake oil" salesman.

Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor created The Four-Way Test. It is an ethical guide for rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships and is often cited at the commencement of club meetings. The test asks the following questions:

Of the things one thinks, says or does:

Is it the truth?

Is if fair to all concerned?

Will it build goodwill and bet-

ter friendships? Will it be beneficial to all con-

cerned?

Many years before Mr. Taylor, the Apostle Paul, in speaking to the church in Galatia, presented that the fruit of the Spirit of God is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

Look to these characteristics when considering the legitimacy of the advice giver or weighing their advice. To date, there's no better yardstick than these tenets from the 5th Chapter of Galatians.

Imagine having a life that looks abundant to the outside world. An amazing husband, four healthy, wonderful kids, two successful businesses, adoring friends, a great community and church. To the world it looked like Amy Boykin, a Texas native, now a local, had it all and she did. But even with all the accomplishments, she was longing for more. She had no idea what to do. So, she did the one thing she knew would bring her answers, she prayed, and God answered. He said, "Move your family to the Bahamas."

Moving to the Bahamas was not something Amy and her husband Michael, had ever thought they would do. But, it was all they kept hearing from God. And it wasn't, move to a nice resort community in Nassau or Grand Bahama but rather to a small, remote island about 3 miles wide off Eleuthera. It didn't happen overnight; in fact, it took 2 years. And once they arrived on the island it was far from paradise. They were unsure why they were there and what they were meant to be doing. They didn't have work visas. Their extended families back home were not supportive of their decision. And with four small children, it was not a good time to be spending their savings. Again, in a state of vulnerability, they prayed. And God answered, "If you need food, then fish." And this is how the epic story goes, one that Amy shares in her first autobiography, The Way: God's call on an Ordinary Family to His Extraordinary Life. It was a journey of pure faith.

God placed a calling in her heart. And when she and her family took that giant leap of faith, they never looked back. The call was to simply do whatever God said. They would pray daily to get answers to any of their questions. As their new life unfolded, they discovered new friends, Haitian refugees, who were also in need of food.

"Motivated by love and generosity, what first began as just sharing fish with the least of these in our community, eventually grew into creating a church that has now tripled in size over the past three years," Amy shares. But it wasn't easy. The Boykins prevailed against many difficulties that surpassed just needing food. Rejections, strange illnesses and persecution were just some of the battles. It would have been easy to go back to their normal life, but they stayed on. Why? Because God asked them to.

What would it be like to have that kind of faith in God? Why do we love to be inspired? Is it because we all have the same desire to live fulfilled? We all want to utilize the gifts He bestows on us, to live for more and be hungry for lives that takes us past the very depths of our own vulnerabilities. But at the same time, it fills us with more love than we ever thought possible. It's a burning necessity instilled in our

essence, just waiting to be used. It is our calling.

The Boykin's story seemed impossible. How many times do we come to those impasse moments in our own lives? But she persevered and didn't stop. She had faith.

Faith, it's a big commitment. It takes courage and will test every part of you. Through prayer, all that is against you becomes powerless. Amy is a beacon of light. Sometimes we just need a match to light our flame. Let her story be the one that helps ignite your soul on its faith journey. You were created in greatness, and we're all waiting to read your story next.





One Word

As a child he had a severe speech impediment. In elementary school, classmates used to call him "Elmer" after the cartoon character Elmer Fudd who stuttered every time he opened his mouth. So many people did so, other classmates began to think Elmer was his real name. In the third grade, his mom took him to a speech class. Unfortunately, in those days at that particular school, the speech class was a holding room for students with discipline problems, so it had very little to do with speech. Mom took him out of that class, but not before he was labeled with even more nicknames than before. The following years were spent with a mixture of both progress and disaster. There are good memories like being able to do well at a school talent show in front of hundreds of people. But there are also bad memories, like the time he froze when giving a presentation in history class and the students erupted into laughter

Many famous people have overcome stuttering and have gone on to enjoy successful careers. From King George VI to Samuel L. Jackson, many people have overcome their handicaps. Yet, many more with speech im-



pediments never reach their full potential. Although there is more attention given to the subject of bullying today than decades ago, being bullied for the way one speaks is still very much a crisis. School classrooms are filled with bullies ready to mock and ridicule those who do not speak like the rest. Just having a strong accent from another part of the country can bring mockery from peers. But in such cases, the origin of why a person speaks differently is generally understood. It's not as easy to understand why a person stutters.

There are three types of stuttering: developmental stuttering, neurogenic stuttering and psychogenic stuttering. Developmental stuttering usually happens between the ages of two and five. This is when a child's speech and language development lags behind. Neurogenic stuttering happens when there are signal problems between the brain, nerves and muscles involved in speech. Psychogenic stuttering usually happens after an emotional trauma. It can also be due to issues with thinking or reasoning. If a person's brain is racing much quicker than words are being spoken, stuttering often occurs. Complications of stuttering can include limited participation in activities, low self-esteem, poor school performance and social problems.

Here are some solutions to consider with a child struggling with stuttering. Try to provide a relaxed environment. Encourage the child to talk about fun and easy topics. Try not to react in a negative way, and instead, praise the child for correct speech. Don't interrupt while he or she is speaking. Speak slowly, as this may help them to speak slowly. Pay attention when they speak. Wait for the child to say words or sentences without saying them for him or her. Talk openly about the stuttering if the child brings up the subject. And most importantly, seek medical and professional help.

While attending a youth camp at the age of fifteen, a counselor instructed all of the boys to take a rock large enough to write on and put it in their pocket. They walked to a stream and stood in a line at the water's edge. The counselor gave everyone a black marker, and they were instructed to write one word on the rock. Whichever word they chose was to represent something they wanted removed from their lives. He thought about writing the word "stuttering," but instead wrote the word "fear." No counselor had ever directly said that fear was the root of his stuttering problem, yet somehow, instinctively, he knew it was. Something happened inside when he threw that rock into the water. It's not to say there were never any struggles with speech issues again, but the fear was now gone.







I once heard that the definition of maturity is deciding to do things you don't want to do because they need to get done. If that's true, then most of us are super mature. We all have our own lists of things we don't want to do but need to get done. Vacuuming comes to mind, that's why robotic vacuums have become so popular. I wish they would invent a robotic shower and toilet cleaner. Folding laundry falls into many of our lists. We taught our three children how to sort, fold and put away their own laundry; we called it a life skill. Laundry is no one's favorite either, however, we wash and dry several loads each week. Washers and drvers are among the costliest appliances to operate so it's worth taking steps to reduce energy use while using them.

Here's how your washer and dryer compare to two other high energy users in your home, and some things you can do to save in the laundry room to reduce wear and tear on clothes.

Wash with cold water.

Using cold water instead of hot can cut a load's energy use by more than half. Many detergents clean just as well in cold as they do in warm or hot water. So save the hot water for your shower. **Wash full loads.** Your washer will use about the same amount of energy no matter the size of the load, so fill it up.

Dry right-sized loads for your machine.

If the dryer is too full, it will



take longer for the clothes to dry. Loads that are too small can also take longer to dry, plus you spend more per item when drying only a few things.

Use dryer balls.

Wool or rubber dryer balls will help separate your clothes and get more air to them, cutting the drying time. The wool balls are said to absorb some moisture, further cutting drying time.

Switch loads while the dryer is warm.

This will allow you to use the remaining heat inside of the dryer for the next cycle.

Clean the lint filter on the dryer.

The dryer will run more efficiently and safely. If you use dryer sheets, scrub the filter once a month with a toothbrush to remove film buildup that can reduce air circulation.

Use the high-speed or extended spin cycle in the washer.

This will remove as much moisture as possible before drying, reducing your drying time and the wear on your clothes from the high heat of the dryer.

Use lower heat settings in the dryer.

Even if the drying cycle is longer, you'll use less energy and be less likely to over-dry your clothes.

Dry towels and heavier cottons separately from lighter-weight clothes.

You'll spend less time drying the lighter-weight clothes.

Check with your utility company about time of use rates Utility companies offer reduced kWh rates everyday during off peak times, almost by half. Check with your utility company when off peak hours are and use high demand appliances during those times, saving you money.


