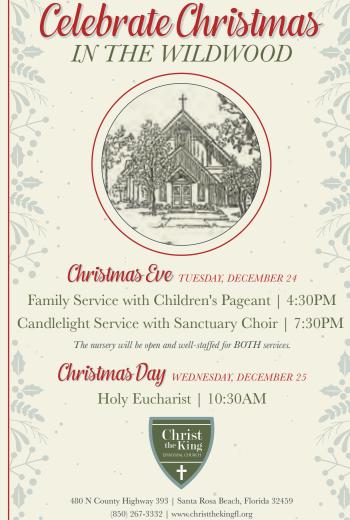

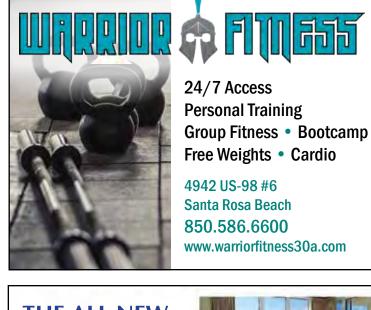
There is also a need for warm weather clothing. Schools have called Caring and Sharing to let them know that kids are playing outside in the cold weather and gifted to a child in need."

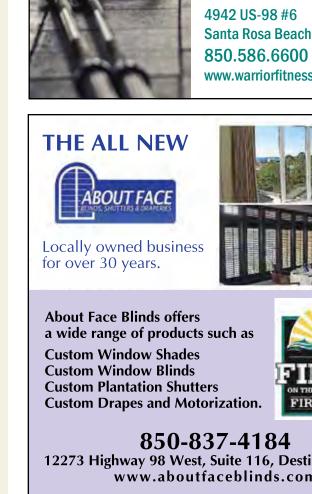

Our Guest Columnist; A George Washington Christmas

The father of our nation knew how to throw a Christmas party. I'm talking thousands of pounds of bacon, gallons of homemade rye whiskey, a massive "great cake" and what he called an "attack of Christmas pies." Everyone got four days off to celebrate at his Mount Vernon plantation and while there was no regular scheduled appearance by Santa, there was at least one recorded visit by a camel. But the abundant Christmas feasts of Washington's later years were preceded by some years that were lean on Christmas cheer.

When young George was 8 years old in 1740, his home caught fire on Christmas Eve. As a soldier in the British army,

Eve of 1753 in a remote outpost known as Murdering Town getting in a skirmish with local Indians, followed by a gift-giving trip to a local "Indian Queen."

The War for Independence brought highs and lows even on holy days. The low point was inevitably Christmas at Valley Forge, where many soldiers were near starvation and along with the meager mutton and cabbage, there was no whiskey or wine. The high point was the Christmas night where Washington caught snoring Hessians unaware as he crossed the Delaware River and attacked Trenton to turn the tide of the war. Another high point was during the first Christmas of the American Revolution, Martha Washington traveled to Cambridge, Massachusetts to be with her husband. Martha's presence at the Continental Army's winter encampments not only encouraged George Washington, but also boosted the morale of the entire camp.

But George Washington's best Christmas was in 1783. About 236 years ago, he rode up to Mount Vernon to celebrate his first holiday at home after eight years of revolution. He had resigned his commission just days before and was determined to surprise his family with his presence. They, in turn, surprised him with a feast that would almost make King George III feel at home.

Martha hoped that from this moment they would grow old together. That Christmas wish was not to be. But the intervening years were as close to a domestic life as Washington ever experienced. Christmas in the young Republic was a different affair than we celebrate today. There was no Santa Claus and no Christmas tree—a custom brought later by German immigrants. Gift-giving was not the focus-instead it was all about the family feast—a time to socialize and give faith-filled thanks for the year ending and the new one about to begin.

Christmas Day was primarily a religious holiday, though Washington was at best an occasional churchgoer. Records show that he was more likely to attend the celebration of St. John the Evangelist at local Masonic lodges on the 27th of December each year than Christmas Day services, though he was a frequent parishioner at St. Paul's Chapel in lower Manhattan after he was president.

The Christmas season lasted more than a week and it was a time of great celebration.

Presidential Christmases in New York and then Philadelphia were more formal affairs with leading legislators than the family-focused fetes most enjoyed by Washington at Mount Vernon. Often in physical distress and under unaccustomed political attack, after the big meal and a winter walk, Washington would play cards and write letters, restrained by the responsibilities of being chief executive.

A few years of retirement brought Washington back to his beloved Mount Vernon, with its year-crowning Christmas cheer. In 1798 with the young people away, George and Martha Washington had a relatively quiet Christmas, the last they would spend together. George Washington died eleven days before Christmas in 1799.

Have a Merry Christmas! May God bless you and your family on this special day.

Quality Affordable Housing in Walton County

Nearly everyone now knows Walton County is one of the fastest growing counties in the United States. For years now Walton County has had one of the lowest unemployment rates in Florida. It also enjoys the influx of over 4 million annual visitors flocking to its white sandy beaches. Anywhere one goes today in Walton county there are signs seeking workers. With plenty of high-paying jobs, loads of visitors and all of this annual growth, this has created one huge problem, no affordable housing.

The average rent for a standard 3 bedroom home is now more than \$2,000/month from Freeport and South Walton. The average cost of a new 3 bed/2 bath home is more than \$400,000 in this same area. Add to this one last driving factor of a Hurricane stricken Bay County right next door and now there's a HUGE demand for "Quality Affordable Housing". Whether renting or buying, the challenge is the same. There are one-bedroom apartments, although rare, renting for



\$1500+/month. In Freeport, there are currently less than 7 available rental units on the market with the demand needing 30+ per month.

The main limiting factor for Walton County's continued growth is both infrastructure and affordable housing. With this in mind there are several projects in Freeport now that are addressing this need. One of them is the revitalized 40+ acre multi-family community the Verandas in Freeport. Just off of Hwy 331 near schools,

the Verandas subdivision has answered this need for affordable housing, but is also offering the quality. A beautiful pool with amenities and large community yards across the street from Freeport Elementary School are a few of the many features of this beautiful subdivision.

The Townhomes are very affordable and start at \$179,900. All units are 3 bedroom, 2.5 baths with standard features included at no additional charge: stainless

steel kitchen appliances, quartz countertops in the kitchens and bathrooms, Rheem high-efficiency heating and cooling systems, crown molding, window coverings, LVP upscale flooring, front and back covered porches, and many others. There are also affordable rentals in this complex that start at \$1500/month for a 3 bed/2.5 bath unit.

Buyers will find the taxes extremely low at an average of \$125/month. Insurance for most

units is less than \$65/month. Estimated monthly costs of electricity and water/sewer are under \$150/month. The homeowners monthly cost is \$75/month and includes all landscape and yard maintenance, pool and amenity maintenance, HOA administrative costs and subdivision upkeep.

The model just opened in September, and more than 74 units have already sold. There are 3 floor plans, one unit includes a full garage. Prices range from \$179,900 to \$209,900. So with the average rent for a 3 bed/2.5 bath home in Freeport \$1650+/month; an average mortgage payment (with a 20% down payment) would be less than \$950/month. Including HOA dues, insurance and taxes, the average cost of ownership would save a buyer \$400+/month and they would OWN their home. The Verandas has 3 local lenders that offer very easy home-buying packages for all those interested.

Resources for Coping with Loss this Holiday Season

Not everyone you meet will be feeling "merry and bright" this holiday season. For some, it will be their first Christmas following the death of a loved one. For others, going through a separation or divorce, facing a new diagnosis or medical condition, having a faith crisis, or other major life changes can risk "ruining" a time of year once held dear.

The good news is that, if you are one of those people, YOU ARE NOT ALONE, and there are resources to help you cope. Recently, retired counselor and thanatologist, Peggy Koblenzer, a part-time resident of South Walton, spoke to members at Christ the King Episcopal Church and Caring and Sharing of South Walton's Communities of Transformation program about how to be proactive in your approach to the holiday season after a loss. Some of her advice included the following

Have a plan. Think through the different aspects of the holiday, from shopping to decorating to religious and family rituals, and decide with other family members how you want to approach them. Peggy had a great holiday checklist for this purpose, that I am happy to

share upon request!

Give yourself permission to do some things differently. This acknowledges that, because of your loss, things ARE different. It can remove some of the most painful "triggers" of your grief and pave the way for new traditions for your new reality.

If the loss is of someone that you love and want to remember, decide how you want to include the memory of that person in how you celebrate.

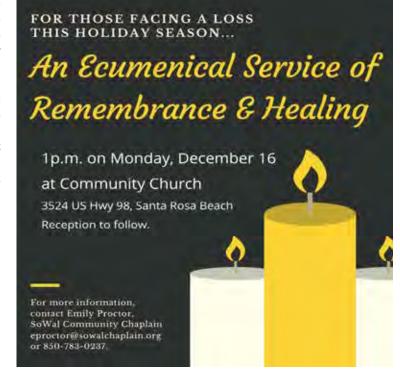
Resist the tendency to isolate. Identify those people who can best support you during this time, and include them in your planning.

In addition to this advice, I would also lift up that there are several local support groups that can be a resource to you, and which you can find listed at sowalchaplain.org/resources/supportgroups. Another tool

that I often use with individuals is called a Wellness Recovery Action Plan, which can be helpful for those grieving, or in recovery from an addiction or mental illness. You can learn more about it at https://mentalhealthrecovery.com/. In a crisis, the 2-1-1 Panhandle Helpline (850-892-4357) can connect you with an on-call mental health professional at anytime. And the Mental Health Association of Okaloosa & Walton Counties (http://mhaow.org/) can help connect you to professional counselors practicing in your

ters are collaborating again to offer an Ecumenical Service of Remembrance and Healing at 1 p.m. on Monday, December 16 at the chapel of Community Church (3524 US Hwy 98, Santa Rosa Beach). The service will not include a sermon or communion, but will have a time to light a candle in remembrance of a loved one and/or to request individual prayers for healing from the pastors in attendance. A brief reception will follow. If you or someone you know is facing a loss this holiday season, we hope you will join us. Remember, friends don't let friends grieve alone.

The team at BeGenerous is grateful for the donations they received at their 2nd Annual Gathering in the Garden held at Point Washington Preserve Pavilion in November. The event helped bring awareness to BeGenerous' efforts assisting victims and survivors of addiction and sex trafficking in our area, their vision for The Yellow House Project, and raise money for their operating expenses

Currently BeGenerous does not have beds and supplies available and relies on a network to help assist these women in need. Stephanie McMinn, founder and director of BeGenerous, de-

scribed their efforts as "doing the Yellow House Project without our yellow house," which includes paying detox fees, travel expenses for relocation, deposits for other transition homes, and paying program fees to other recovery centers.

However, BeGenerous is praying for the love and support of the community this Christmas season to help them raise enough money for The Yellow House Project to purchase a property for their own home in Santa Rosa Beach. They are hoping to meet the deadline by the end of this year.

The Yellow House Project is transitional living for women recovering from addiction and abuse from sex trafficking. While in the home, the women will be a part of a 90-day Christ based program where they can receive counseling and start the healing process. There will be an option to stay long term up to 18 months if necessary.

profiting from the victim.

Those who work in the sex industry are often victims of sex trafficking. There is a misconception that strippers and prostitutes have chosen their lifestyle, but often they are victims of deeply rooted trauma that stems from



low House to be established. To fill the gap, to be that bridge we need because so often what happens is, we have a woman we are working with and there's no beds available." Not having a safe place to go to make that transition is sometimes a life or death situation for these women.

It may come as a surprise to some, but addiction and sex trafficking are very prevalent in our area. Sex trafficking can include force and or coercion of a victim to be sexually exploited. Many times, at the hands of someone the victim knows. Familial sex trafficking is an example of this, where a child is exploited for the exchange of drugs, a place to live, or money. This is different from abuse because the trafficker is

years of manipulation, coerced addiction, threats of violence against their family, and physical and emotional abuse endured by the victim. Many women in the area are being exploited in plain sight.

While there are great programs in the area to help women overcome their circumstances, there are not enough places to stay while in transition. "I'm traveling to Alabama, if not weekly, every other week, to relocate girls, and to get them to one of our partner programs," said Stephanie. "We just really need to get a house as soon as possible. We have so many girls that need help."

Stephanie has a bigger vision for the program, establishing a

social enterprise as their income generating model to support operational expense and create a savings account for when the women transition out. The women will gain work skills, gain confidence and have money set aside to start over. Stephanie calls it, All Things New. "That's what God does in us. He takes away the old and makes something new and beautiful," said Stephanie. Women could garden, repurpose furniture, make pottery and fix jewelry. "We hope to be able to help them establish an income, a career, maybe even inspire them to start their own business.

The property they are hoping to raise enough money for The Yellow House Project has acreage for equine therapy, box gardens, a pond for devotion time, workshops, chicken pens, and land for more transitional homes. It has everything they would need. While this property in South Walton is \$625,000, Stephanie's faith doesn't waiver. "The Lord led me to this house."

Tracy and I were privileged to sit down with Haruko Shi at her beautiful home in Santa Rosa Beach. She served us the most delicious martini I've ever had, something with peach in it. Just the night before our interview she was overseeing a team of workers serving drinks and hors d'oeuvres at a rehearsal dinner attended by Governor Mike Huckabee and his daughter, Sarah Huckabee Sanders.

Her official title at Watercolor Resort, where the event was held, is Beverage Captain. An interesting title, to be sure, but her job entails much more than martinis. She is responsible for organizing and executing banquet events for the St. Joe Company, Watercolor Resort's parent organization.

On her off nights, away from the million-dollar weddings at the Watercolor Lake House, Haruko can be found in much more intimate settings. For the past few years she has moonlighted as a private sushi chef. Visit her website, www.sushiruko.com, and book her for a private party, a date night with your spouse, or a real estate open house. She even gives sushi making lessons upon request.

Haruko's path from a child-

hood in China to an Emerald Coast caterer was an interesting one. The daughter of an accountant and a factory worker, Haruko was born Chun Ying Shi in Shanghai. (Her given name, Chun, means "spring." The Japanese equivalent of the word spring is "haruko"). She obtained a business administration degree and immediately went into business for herself; first selling clothing and accessories and then as the owner of a Shanghai nightclub called Sparkle, which she built from scratch in the mid-1990s with seed money from her parents. In the busy months before opening her nightclub, she remembers often sleeping in her car to save travel time.

It was at Sparkle's sushi bar that she was introduced to that particular culinary art, although the finer points of its preparation were to come later.

After five years in the nightclub business, Haruko became restless and was ready to make another move. She wanted to see the world. What better way than to start an international import/ export business? She did some research and decided that the Cayman Islands, literally on the exact opposite side of the world from Shanghai, would be a good place to do that. So, off she went



to the Caribbean.

She obtained a temporary work permit in the Caymans and landed a job at a Hyatt Hotel in the capital of George Town in early 2002. The plan was to work at the hotel until she could launch her import/export business. Having some experience with sushi from her night-club days, Hyatt allowed her to train with a Japanese master sushi chef. Within six months she was running the sushi bar at the hotel.

In the Caymans she became well-known for her sushi making. She was on the cover of magazines and even had a TV show. The hotel paid her a good salary in addition to covering her food, lodging and expenses. But for



Haruko life is not about money. It's about experience. After five years in the Caymans, the tiny island nation could no longer contain her ambition.

"I needed something new," she said. "I wanted to learn something more."

She fell in love with Florida while traveling in Miami as a tourist. In 2007 she left the Caymans for good and began working at a Hyatt in Sarasota. Two years later she became an American citizen.

It was photography that first brought her to our area. She had always been passionate about taking photographs, especially on the beach. A few years after arriving in the states, she did a Google search for the best beaches in Florida, and decided to take her camera to South Walton. She has been here ever since. And this latest move she says, is permanent. She met her fiancé, Will Sullivan, a professional photographer, while both of them were shooting beach scenes at the Ed Walline public beach access at the same time. They take frequent photography adventures together around the world.

As Tracy and I were finishing our peach martinis we asked Haruko to recommend a local place to experience sushi. She encourages everyone to try Sushimoto in Miramar Beach.

Exercise. Discipline. Affection. Rules. Boundaries. Limitations. These words have been ingrained in my mind over the years as I've followed the training methods of Cesar Millan, the "Dog Whisperer"; first on his television show and then again in person, when training under his leadership, at his ranch in Santa Clarita, Califor-

And since I've trained with some of the top dog behaviorists in the country, all who follow the same concepts. Dog behaviorist is really applied psychology. First, we figure out why a dog is doing what he/she is doing, and then we can help create a path to resolving their issues. If you have children, most likely you lay down rules and set boundaries and limitations every day, in order for them to become wellbalanced adults. Make your bed, clean your room, take out the garbage, don't play in the street, do your homework are just a few of the "commands" moms and dads use everyday. Well, the same goes for dogs.

Many times the first issue is exercise. Taking your dog for a walk or putting them on a treadmill- if you have one, is great for "brain drain." Remember: a tired dog is a happy dog! Letting them out in your back yard isn't enough and doesn't fulfill most dogs' needs. A pack walk allows for bonding with your dog, even if the "pack" only



provide *discipline*. Discipline is time for affection because it will

encourage that behavior. When I'm working with a dog for behavior modification, I always thank them for responding positively to my request. All of your efforts to provide

structure, exercise and discipline will ultimately result in trust, loyalty and respect from the dog. And you'll have a calm pack too!

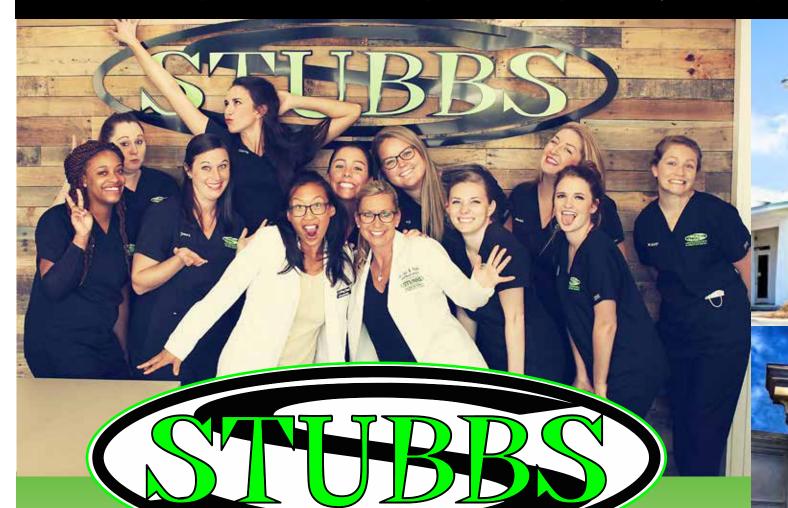

As investors look toward 2020 and back on recent history, there are a lot of things on their minds. They have a lot on their minds because the market, at least in the last two years, has had some significant moves. Last year the market ended up with dramatic selloffs around Christmas making December 2018 one of the worst months for performance in the history that records were kept. And this year, investors (growth or equityoriented investors) have seen returns that have far surpassed historical numbers. More conservative or income-oriented investors have seen the interest on their bonds and or savings decline as interest rates have reversed themselves over the past year.

So, looking into the end of the year and in to next and beyond, what are things that investors might want to be considering? We can start at a macro level with interest rates. World monetary policy and domestically, the Federal Reserve policy has been what is called quite dovish as world banks and the Fed have insured there is a significant supply of money in the system. This was done because of concerns over an economic slowdown (take Germany as an example). Some rates around the world have now turned negative where the investor gets back less than what was invested but do get the return of the face amount of what they bought. The result has been the return to lower rates of return for safe and for conservative investments. The implication is that those investors might take on more risk by considering investments (high yielding dividend stocks as an example). Thing to consider: Is that driving up stock prices?

Secondly, trade as a consideration. Here in the U.S., industry leaders are planning with less certainty than they have had in the past because the outcomes of trade negotiations are not fully known yet. Are current tariffs hurting trade, cost, industry, profitability? There is nothing conclusive at this point. So, while lower interest rates might be fueling higher asset (read that stock) prices, does trade uncertainty make the stock market more volatile as result. So, second thing to

consider: Will trade uncertainty lead to more short-term volatility.

Lastly, the strength of the economy. While corporate profits have held up, employment is at all time lows and inflation remains low, what about the long-term health of the economy? Investors are left wondering as economic growth is currently about 2.2% and for an economy to sustain growth, most would agree that 3% is a more acceptable or needed growth rate. What about the state of U.S. manufacturing? Currently it is not seen as robust and many think that important to sustain asset prices (stock prices). So, third thing to consider: What is the long-term strength of the U.S. and world economy.

Historically, stocks have outperformed bonds as well as cash instruments for over 90 years. According to Ibbotson and Associate through 2018, stocks have returned 10%, government bonds returning 5.5% and Treasury bills (closely related to cash) 3.47%. Inflation by contrast has average 2.9% in that time frame.

In the short run, stocks have proven more volatile. In the past vear alone the S&P 500 has averaged 13.7% but over the last two years, 9.3%. Investors can look back further and see that for five years it is 8.7% and for 10 years 11%. You can keep going and see that at 15 years it is 6.7% (accounts for a lot of volatility in 2008) and 20 years 8%.

That might have investors wondering when to "get in" and when to "get out." There is no strategy or formula for this. Investor may want to recall that familiar saying: They don't ring a bell at the top and they don't ring a bell at the bottom. Unless the need for cash or income is now. staying the course,if an investor has a long term time frame (meaning at least 10 years), stocks might offer the best option.

Before beginning or altering a plan, investors should work with and advisor, or do their own research if they prefer to build a plan for their long-term wealth as well as for their current or long-term income and sav-

Gifted Program

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December in Topsail Hill Preserve State Park

December rolls in to the park with chilly temperatures, red berries on the Yaupon Holly trees and the start of Prescribed Fire season. Prescribed Fires are an important natural resource management tool the park uses to help stabilize the ecosystems with the park, reduce excess brush, return nutrients to the soil and encourage new growth of native vegetation. Did you know the habitats of many plants and animals also rely on periodic fire? Pine trees such as the Long Leaf pine tree, needs the stress from heat to open up its pine cones and release its seeds. With fire, the Long Leaf pine tree is able to naturally re-establish its presence in the environment. Animals like the Florida Gopher Tortoise and the Bobwhite Quail benefit as well since excess ground cover and invasive vegetation is lessened with prescribed fires.

Prescribed fires are executed with intention and a series of conditions are met before the first flame of fire even touches the ground. The park staff works closely with the Florida Forest Service to ascertain whether a prescribed fire can potentially be conducted in the park as well as getting the final go ahead on the day of to conduct the fire within the park.

Are you wondering how you



can find out if there is potentially going to be a prescribed fire at the park or if there is going to be a prescribed fire a day you're heading to the park? Sign up for the park's "Park News" digital newsletter. You can find a link to do so on the Friends of Topsail Hill Preserve State Park's website www.topsailparkfriends. org. For safety reasons during a prescribed fire there may be certain trails closed in the park, so please always check at the

ranger station for any trail clo-

Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center Inc., **Celebrates 20 Years Serving our Community**

Let's celebrate and praise the Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center, (ECCAC) celebrating 20 years of life-changing service within our community. With a mission of preventing child abuse and neglect, protecting children, and restoring the lives and futures of those impacted, the ECCAC fills a crucial need locally between two locations in Niceville and DeFuniak Springs. Both centers house a multidisciplinary team of child protection personnel, prosecutors, law enforcement, Department of Children and Families (DCF), therapists, therapy dogs, staff and volunteers. Providing services and emotional support to child victims experiencing abuse, abandonment or neglect is the 24/7 job of the multidisciplinary team of staff and volunteers. All services are provided at no cost by the non-profit organization. In 2018 alone, the ECCAC provided services for 780 children, each of whom received counseling and other assistance free of charge.

Since 2000, the organization has seen tremendous growth, but it took major grassroots work and support from our community. When the first center opened their doors, it was run by a staff of three on an annual operating budget of just \$180,000. Today the organization has grown with two loca-

tions in Okaloosa and Walton County, a team of 21 people and an impressive \$1.6 million dollar budget; some 60% of which is raised through special events, private donations and community-sponsored fundraisers. The remainder is generated through grant requests and government funding. To date, the ECCAC has helped more than 14,000 children and provided educational child abuse prevention techniques for 35,000 more.

As their 20th anniversary and the holiday season draws near, there are many ways you can support the organization and give back to the children in our community who need it the most. "Statistics tell us roughly 37% of all children under the

Likewise, more than 30 million men in the United States have erectile dysfunction (ED) or an inability to sustain an erection to have intercourse. Medications and penile prostheses are offered to men and have helped somewhat. While ED statistics increase with age, this common condition does not have to be part of the aging process.

Platelet Rich Plasma (PRP) is a revolutionary rejuvenating treatment that addresses all of these concerns. 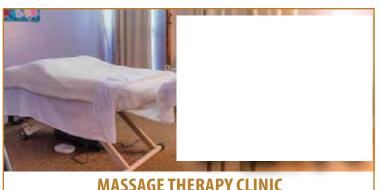

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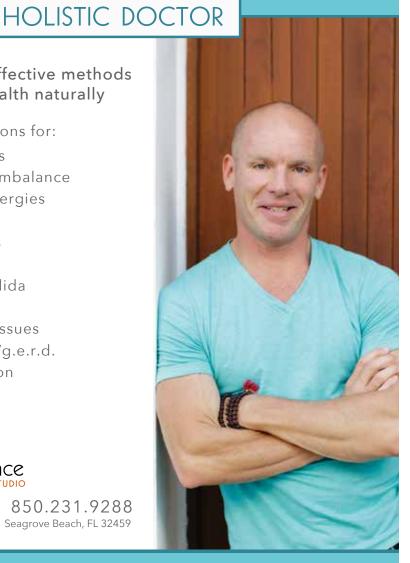

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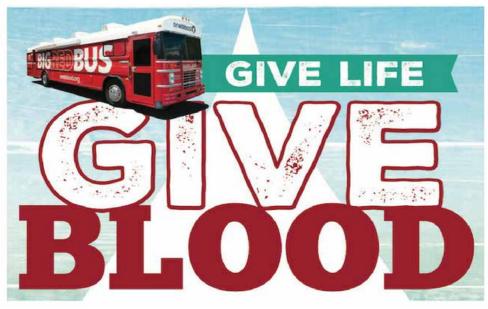

There I sat crying in a butter-soaked shirt, holding a tired, screaming baby wondering why I ever agreed to 3 Christmases in one day. It was our baby son's first Christmas, what was supposed to be a picturesque, magical day to remember. We decorated, put our son in his Christmas sweater, baked requested casseroles, packed thoughtful gifts, dressed in new clothes, and journeyed to 3 family gatherings that ended in tears and overwhelm. Is this really what Christmas is supposed to be? Stressful, exhausting, overwhelming, and disappointing? Is there another way?

Historically, Christmas and the preceding weeks were about ex-

pectations surrounding the birth of Jesus. Currently, you might find yourself juggling spiritual and cultural expectations around Christmas and other Winter holidays including stylish decorations, hosting gatherings, spiritual reflections, church activities, perfect gift-giving, family traditions, meaningful time with extended family, etc. With

good intentions, you may place impossible expectations on a few weeks of the year to bring fulfillment and happy memories. Afterward, you can be left with the disappointing reality of hurt feelings, burnt ham, criticism from family, underwhelming responses to gifts, and kids preferring to text friends instead of playing family board games.

So, what can be done? Here are 5 Ways to De-Stress

Here are 5 Ways to De-Stress Your Holidays:

Sort your expectations into two categories: healthy and unhealthy. Healthy expectations are reasonable, gracious, encourage growth, and don't result in shame. Unhealthy expectations are idealistic, unreasonable, perfectionistic, involve trying to control others, and result in feeling ashamed. Reducing stress begins with getting curious about what you are expecting of yourself and others. Are you trying to present a perfect image of yourself? Are you trying to get someone else to be who you want them to be? Are you trying to get an emotional need met from someone who is not likely to meet that need?

Consider what you fear will happen if you let your unhealthy expectations go. Most often you hold unhealthy expectations because you fear loss of control, when in reality, you didn't really have control in the first place. Admitting that you only have control of yourself can set you free and empower you to manage yourself in healthier ways.

Identify unhealthy expectations that others may have invited you to fulfill. Maybe you're still seeking approval

from your parents, or hustling to live up to social expectations of friends, or exhausting yourself trying to keep your kids happy. If you find yourself resenting someone, it's often a sign that unrealistic expectations are present in the relationship.

Set boundaries with yourself and others. Adjust unhealthy personal expectations and allow time to realize your worst fears will not be realized as a result. Try giving yourself permission to say no to unhealthy requests of others even if someone will be disappointed. They will survive the disappointment and so will you. Boundaries are usually uncomfortable initially and then all involved get used to them over time. In the long-term, such boundaries create oxygen for life.

Decide how you will fill the space that results from letting go of unhealthy expectations. When you think about what feels healthy and meaningful around the holidays, do that and enjoy it deeply.

For us, letting go of unhealthy expectations has set us free from exhausting, expensive, perfection-oriented busyness and created space for intentional, reflective, restful, family time on Christmas Day. The difference is astounding. What will you do to create and enjoy healthier space this holiday season?

Chase, my fiancé, and I each ordered a glass of Dr. Loosen Riesling and the tuna poke lettuce wraps to begin our dining experience. The tuna wraps with yellow beets, jalapeno-watermelon marinade, and caramelized onion crema, coupled with the fresh tuna, made for a very light and refreshing appetizer. We also ordered an arugula salad, and for something that is very simple, it packed a lot of flavor! The lychee-hibiscus vinaigrette dressing and toasted pecans combined with the blue

cheese and shallot confit, married well together. Joe, the general manager, came to check in on us frequently and to make sure that we were enjoying the food and drinks while simultaneously filling us in on the restaurant's background and chefs. Our waitress, Natalia, was extremely helpful with recommendations as well as making sure that we did not need anything further. Chase and I were both torn on whether to

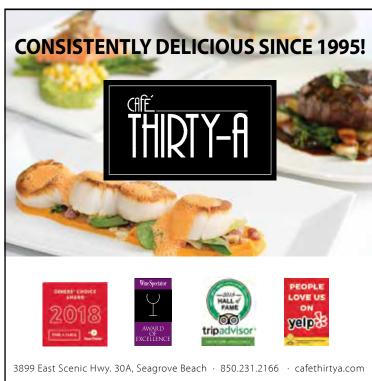
try one of their signature staple dishes or one of the their newer selections. Ultimately, we decided to order a dish from each. Chase went with the jerk crusted gulf snapper, a decision that he did not regret. The flavors of the Caribbean challenged the taste buds in George's second most popular dish, and is served with pineapple salsa over forbidden black rice complete with plantains; just phenomenal!

My entree, on the other hand, was part of the new menu. After much debate between the scallops and the chicken, I decided to go with the chicken. Very aptly named "Sunday Roast Chicken," this dish was by far the most tender that I ever tasted. Simply prepared quality ingredients made each savory bite better than the next. It was out of this world! The chicken definitely tastes like something that your grandmother would make on a Sunday afternoon after church. Nestled over delicious savory bread pudding and drizzled with pan gravy, I can honestly say it was one of the best dishes that I have ever tried, hands down; words do not do this dish justice!

Both of our entrees were generously sized, but magically, we somehow still had a little room for dessert. After perusing the dessert menu for a solid ten minutes, my eyes kept coming back to the hummingbird cake and the warm chocolate toffee goo (which is their most popular dessert dish). The cake, which contains brown butter cream cheese frosting, edible flowers, and candied pecan nut crumb, is very light and sweet; it vaguely reminds me of bananas foster, except lighter. The chocolate goo, as you probably would have guessed, is full of chocolate it sweetly boasts a chocolate brownie topped with unctuous ice cream, chocolate sauce, and chocolate mousse. This dish is any dessert lovers dream chocolate heaven! All in all, our experience with George's was absolutely delightful. Everything from the food to the atmosphere to the friendly wait staff makes this a great place to dine for the perfect date night or a night out with the entire family.

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Recipe of the Month; Christmas Morning Strata

For as long as my memory can recall, my family has eaten the same breakfast every Christmas morning- my mother's savory egg strata, warm homemade cranberry bread, and my dads sausage balls.

The strata, essentially a savory bread pudding with eggs, sausage, and cheddar cheese, is made the day before, and easily baked on Christmas morning. My dad, donning the red pajamas he wears each year, wakes up early to turn on all of the Christmas lights, and the traditional holiday tunes. The rest of us rumble out of bed, and make our way around the tree, nibbling on generational recipes of sweet and savory delights while we peek into our stockings, followed by the opening of gifts one at a time. If you're a local or visiting South Walton, I recommend visiting the Seaside Farmers Market for your fresh eggs in this dish, as well as stopping by Ocheesee Creamery for your butter, milk and cheese needs. You will also find wonderful breads for your holiday meals.

Serves 4 to 6 people.

Ingredients:

8 slices bread, preferably an Italian style deli loaf, cut 1/2 of an inch thick

1 pound plain, sage or hot pork sausage, your preference

1 teaspoon prepared mustard

1 cup shredded sharp cheddar

6 eggs, slightly beaten

1 and 1/2 cup whole milk

3/4 cup half and half

1/2 teaspoon ground sea salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

Dash of nutmeg

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Dash of cayenne

Preparation:

Place bread into a 10 by 16 baking pan, sprayed with nonstick spray or rubbed with butter. Brown sausage and drain off any excess fat. Stir in mustard, and spoon sausage evenly over bread. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Combine remaining ingredi-

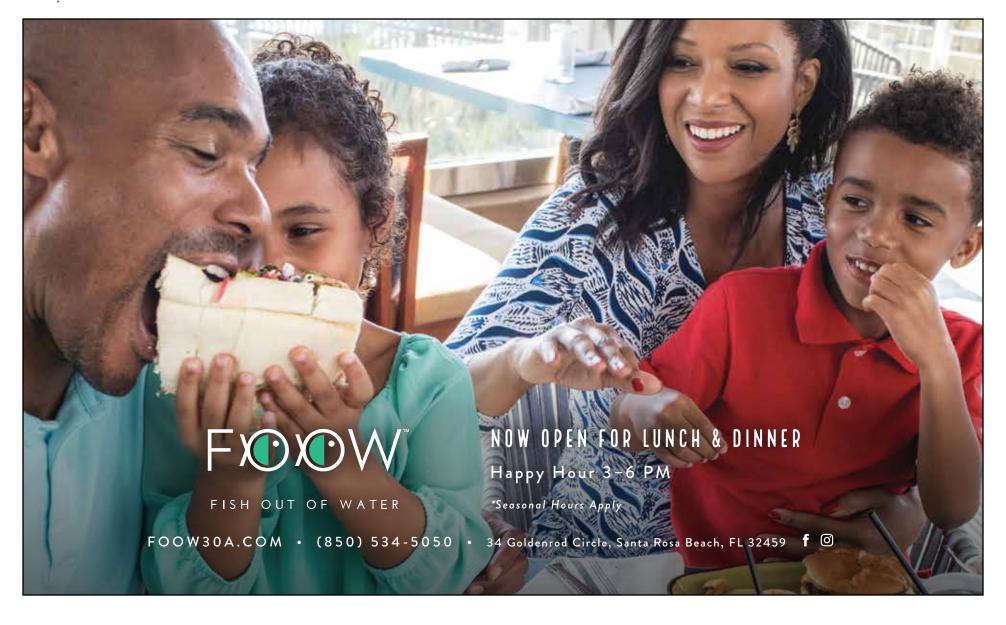

ents (eggs, milk, half and half, and Worcestershire sauce), pour salt, pepper, nutmeg, cayenne over cheese and sausage.

Bake at 350°F for 30 minutes. Note: This is best if made the day before and refrigerated overnight. Warm to room temperature before baking.

Also, a pound of bacon cooked and crumbled, or 2 cups of good ham chopped, can be substituted in the recipe.

Frank Steven Jackson November 29, 1950-Oct. 11, 2019

Frank Steven Jackson, better known to everyone as Franko "Washboard" Jackson, passed away peacefully Friday, October 11, at home with his wife and family.

Born in Oklahoma in 1950 Frank Jackson grew up listening to his Mama play her hot pink upright piano and her homemade wind instrument, a comb and a piece of cellophane. Frank and his three siblings grew up dancing and playing music on a multitude of homemade instruments. This love of homemade music runs deep in the soul of Mr. Jackson and in 1975 after a move to a commune in Lick Creek Missouri he found out he was not alone.

Frank was introduced to the music of "Jug Juke and Washboard Band," real people making real music on handmade instruments. He loved the sound. He loved the message. If you wanted to play music bad enough you could, just like his Mama. It was then that "Franko Washboard Jackson" was christened.

Soon after, Franko's sister Cindy, who lived in New Orleans, was about to give birth so Franko left the commune to be with her. In his own words, "



There was no keeping me on the farm once I saw New Orleans." A few months later Franko answered an ad in the local paper, "Washboard Player Wanted Non-Professional Only." Washboard Jackson joined "The Bad Oyster Band" and a music career was launched. Their album, "Jugband Music and Blues" is a New Orleans Classic.

In 1984 Jackson had his own band and "Franko and the Hot Damn Jug Band" played the World's Fair in New Orleans six days a week until the fair organizers money ran out. In 1985 he moved to Florida where he met a wild woman with an art all her own, Eileen West, and their shared history began. Soon Franko met a local named Bill Garrett who had an amazing musical talent all his own and "Willie and the Wahoos" were born. Bill Garrett soon discovered that the one and only Duke Bardwell (legendary bassist for Elvis Presley) was in town and persuaded him to come out of retirement.

In 1990 Franko had the band "Hubba Hubba" a local favorite with a plethora of talent. In 2000 Franko Washboard Jack-

son tried his hand at painting and a new passion was born. With influences from Woodie Long and Billie Gaffrey Jackson's art is a reflection of life with a simple yet bold story. You can not look at Washboard's work and not feel the soul of this town.

When choosing electronics: TV's, computers, gaming consoles, etc... always look for Energy Star qualified electronics. These qualified electronics use less energy and save energy. Rechargeable batteries and LED lighting may not be on top of anyone's list but they make great stocking stuffers and saves energy. Also consider using smart power strips and turn off the electronics completely. Many electronics, even when powered off, still use energy. I call them energy vampires.

If you plan to leave this holiday season, think about automating your home. Put exterior and interior lighting on timers to avoid being on all day and night. Add a thermostat which you can control via Wi-Fi and your smart phone, in the event we get a cold streak or heat wave during the week you can control your home's temperature and unplug those energy vampires which use energy even when turned off.
